

The two people are Jon Learn and Oddvar Hemsøe. Jon does documentaries on Keeping Traditions Alive. Oddvar is Director of the Norway Lutefisk Festival held annually in Hamar, a multi-day festival. The purpose of their call was that they want to bring the Lutefisk Festival to Fargo and film a documentary on it using PBS. Jon has connections there. The documentary would start with the fish company in Norway on the boat catching the fish. It would continue through the fish processing all the way to our table at Kringen. Oddvar would bring the Norwegian fish, a chef or two, some students, and some entertainment. They will prepare the lutefisk the Norwegian way, which is different. This will be more than a meal – a cultural experience. It is still in the early planning stages, but we are looking at November 15 or 16.

In the meantime, you can all help:

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GENEALOGY RESEARCH Norwegian Fylker (Counties) are Merging and Will Assume New Names

by Verlyn Anderson - Reprinted from January 2020. Next month, Ray Olson will take you on a tour of the re-revised regions in Norway.

The Norwegian government is making major changes in the Norwegian fylker boundaries and renaming some of them. The map below shows the map of Norway with its fylker the way they are at the present time. As you will note, some of them will merge and will assume new names in 2020.

Many of the *fylker* will have new names for the combined *fylker*, as well as indicating when their mergers will take place. I've arranged the order of the new *fylker* listed below to correspond to the numbers on the map.

My ancestors are from the Hardangerfjord region, which is great because I love the iconic bunad with hardanger embroidery, black skirt, red vest, and blingy jewelry. I learned to do hardanger at Skogfjorden as a child, and got back into it when I joined Sons of Norway several years ago.

Now, bunads are expensive! And apart from Syttende Mai celebrations, there are few opportunities to wear one. So I don't have my own... yet. I do plan on making one eventually.

So why not make one now? This is Quinn, my collie. Her black coat with white collar is somewhat reminiscent of the black skirt and white blouse. I decided to make her a bunad! Here's how I did it.

The black skirt – I omitted it. Her black fur will suffice as the skirt, so all I need is the hardanger apron. I started stitching without a pattern, and to be honest, the hardanger is much larger than I expected, and larger than would be on an authentic bunad. But I was under a deadline and also wanted it to be the centerpiece of her outfit.

The body portion of red fabric is from a sewing pattern for a dog coat. It has a Velcro piece (and added safety pins to keep it on) under her belly. The black and gold ribbon are simply stitched on to indicate the shape of a vest. For the embroidered inset of the bodice, I used cross stitch with an 8-petaled rose design. That part took more time than the hardanger for the apron because it's solid stitching.

There's usually a beautiful sølje worn with a Hardanger bunad, and to be honest, I didn't want to let her wear the one my grandmother gave me. Off to Michaels for some jewelry making supplies. It's not silver, nor spoon-shaped, but it's round and dangly. Since I made this, I have picked up a couple more sølja, and will most likely use one of those the next time Quinn wears her bunad.

The one thing that's not exactly part of the official dress is her collar. I added that at the last minute because her white fur wasn't showing enough. The collar is one my Gramma made many years ago – when separate embroidered collars were supposedly fashionable. I just handstitched it on to represent the traditional white blouse.


Finished! I was done just in time to wear to the Renaissance Festival in Chanhassen, and she wears it every Syttende Mai, even though there's no Children's Parade in my town.

Anyone who's interested in making a bunad for their pet, or learning to do hardanger embroidery, please let me know. We have been talking about starting another hardanger group and would like to gauge interest.

Gleder syttende mai!!





HCSCC Receives Sons of Norway Foundation Grant to Continue Hardanger Fiddle Traditions



The Historical and Cultural Society of Clay County is happy to announce it received a \$5000 Sons of Norway Foundation grant to carry out another apprenticeship for two people to build Hardanger fiddles under the tutelage of Brainerd luthier Robert "Bud" Larsen. Markus Kreuger, the Programming Director at HCSCC was selected as one apprentice. Already a deeply committed woodworker, Krueger will work on making his own fiddle over the next two years along with other people in the community who are at various stages in their fiddle-making process. It takes around 400 hours over two years to complete a fiddle.

Larsen, who apprenticed with Gunnar Helland, the last in a Norwegian family of luthiers, travels to our community several times a year to work with apprentices and also is available via Zoom to instruct. Krueger is also working to document Larsen's teaching through video-recording the lessons with a long-term goal of sharing his skill and knowledge more widely online. Apprentices from North Dakota have been working with Bud over the last decade through the North Dakota Council on the Arts Folk Apprenticeship Program. Two Minnesota apprentices were supported last year by the Lake Region Arts Council, and two more Minnesotans will apprentice this year.

Larsen and Fargo Spelemannslag were recently featured in an article on the Arts Midwest website: https://artsmidwest.org/stories/across-the-uppermidwest-communities-converge-around-norwayshardanger-fiddle/

The recent grant will also help support a public performance of Larsen and Fargo Spelemannslag at the Hjemkomst Center next January as part of the commemoration of 200 years of Norwegian immigration to the US. More on that as plans develop.

Sewing Start-up Makes Folk Costumes Accessible & Green

Norwegian bunads are famously a major investment that can run from \$3,000-\$5,000, depending on the region and what extent of silver jewelry is involved.

Thanks to a sewing start-up called Fæbrik, showing your fashion sense and cultural pride just got a lot more accessible. According to flokk.com, the group was born out of necessity- four friends, Jenny Skavlan, Ingrid Bergtun, Mari Norden, and Ingrid Vik Lysne needed a studio space, and once they were in the same room, the ideas started to flow.

The foursome got to work making accessible patterns to help people sew their own festdrakt (or unofficial folk costume) out of recycled fabrics. The beauty of the fæstdrakt is that it is based on re-use, and there are no rules, unlike the stricter requirements of an official bunad. Do you prefer to wear fuchsia? Tassels and pompoms? Your fæstdrakt can be made in any hue, pattern or texture to suit your personal style and shape.

Fæbrik (a wordplay on the English "fabric" and the Norwegian word for "factory") also makes downloadable patterns, step-by-step videos and offer user-friendly tailoring tips so that each person can create their ideal fit.


Just like that, a pair of lace curtains gain new life as an apron, and a hand-stitched pillowcase is reimagined as a vest. The group has hosted fæstdrakt parades in Oslo's Frogner Park- see the photos in Aftenposten in the pattern for the myriad ways to express one's creativity in this modern take on a folk costume. A few years ago, I came across my great-grandfather's Sons of Norway Constitution book from 110 years ago, which included premiums for three levels of life insurance. The three levels were \$50, \$100 and \$500, and they were single premiums. The death benefits were not listed, but one can only imagine how small they might have been compared to what



they are today. But what we do know is \$1 in 1914 is worth more than \$30 today. So \$500 then would be equivalent to more than \$15,000 today. That would be just about enough to pay for an average funeral today.
